




Method:



The 4 games of the quarter finals were nail-biting matches, with one game going to extra time and then penalties! The final scores were:



Busy Bees!


Ava W 3/4H and Millie W 5/6 L saw a very busy bee when they visited The Barbara Hepworth Museum in St. Ives during the May half-term.

- There are approximately 10,000 three-leaf clovers for every "lucky" four-leaf clover.
- There are no clover plants that naturally produce four leaves, which is why four-leaf clovers are so rare.
- The leaves of four-leaf clovers are said to stand for faith, hope, love, and luck.
- It's often said that Ireland is home to more four-leaf clovers than any other place, giving meaning to the phrase "the luck of the Irish."
- If you're lucky enough to find a four-leaf clover, look for more! If a clover plant produces a four-leaf clover, it's more likely to produce another four-leaf lucky charm than plants that only produce three-leaf clovers.
- The fourth leaf can be smaller or a different shade of green than the other three leaves.

On this day in 1989 Daniel Radcliffe, the English actor who plays Harry Potter is born;


On this day in 1903, the Ford Motor Company sold its first car;

Kinza's Tikka

500g beef/lamb/chicken (your choice) cut into cubes

1/4cup yogurt

2 tablespoons lemon juice

2 tablespoons oil

1/2 tsp (each) salt, red chilli powder, turmeric

1 tsp (each) cumin powder, chilli flakes, ginger paste, garlic paste

Marinate the meat for 2 hours

In the oven bake for 30-40 mins at 220c fan or cook on the barbecue

Biscuits Galore!

We seem to have a shared love of biscuits in the Bramhope Buzz Team. The shortbreads always go first so here is a shortbread recipe

Ingredients

- 125g/4oz unsalted butter, softened
- 55g/2oz caster sugar, plus extra to finish
- 180g/6oz plain flour

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 190C/170C Fan/Gas 5.
2. Beat the butter and the sugar together until smooth.
3. Stir in the flour to get a smooth paste. Turn on to a work surface and gently roll out until the paste is 1cm/1/2in thick.
4. Cut into rounds or fingers and place onto a baking tray. Sprinkle with caster sugar and chill in the fridge for 20 minutes.
5. Bake in the oven for 15-20 minutes, or until pale golden-brown. Set aside to cool on a wire rack.






