- There will be tests in reading, SPaG and maths.
- There isn't a writing test but there is teacher assessment and moderation across the authority.
- Scores are achieved through scaled scores.

- English grammar, punctuation and spelling papers 1 and 2
- Tuesday 14th May
- English reading
- Wednesday 15th May
- Mathematics papers 1 and 2
- Thursday 16th May
- Mathematics paper 3

Organisation

- ▶ The tests take place in 5/6L classroom.
- The children sit at separate tables.
- There will be a breakfast club every morning from 8:30 a.m.
- All equipment will be provided.
- On Friday 17th May, the children choose how they want to spend the day!

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling (Paper 1) focuses on the following areas:

- Grammatical terms/word classes;
- Functions of sentences;
- Combining words, phrases and clauses;
- Verb forms, tenses and consistency;
- Punctuation;
- Vocabulary;
- Standard English and formality.
- Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling (Paper 1) requires a range of answer types such as circling missing capital letters, multiple choice questions, one-word answers, but does not require longer formal answers.



Reading Questions

- Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.
- During the reading paper, a child's inference and deduction skills are thoroughly tested. They will also be expected to answer questions on authorial choices: explaining why an author has chosen to use particular vocabulary, grammar and text features.
- Some questions are multiple choice or selected response; others require short answers and some require an extended response or explanation.
- · PEE!

- There are three different set texts for the children to read, which could be any combination of non-fiction, fiction and/or poetry.
- The Reading paper focuses on the following areas known as Content Domains:

2a) give/explain the meaning of words in context; 2b) retrieve and record information/identify key details from fiction and non-fiction;

2c) summarise main ideas from more than one paragraph;

2d) make inferences from the text/explain and justify inferences with evidence from the text;

2e) predict what might happen from details stated and

implied;

2f) identify/explain how information/content is related and contributes to meaning as a whole;


2g) identify/explain how meaning is enhanced through

choice of words and phrases;


2h) make comparisons within the text.


Maths Paper 1 (Arithmetic) will take place on Wednesday 15th May 2019.


- It has a standard timing of 30 minutes and is worth a total of 40 marks.
- It covers the four operations (division, multiplication, addition, subtraction and mixed operation calculations requiring BODMAS), as well as number properties, calculating percentages of amounts, calculations using decimals, and calculations using fractions.
- Example question:




Maths Paper 1 Arithmetic (40 marks and 30 minutes)









- Maths Paper 2 (Reasoning) will take place on Wednesday 15th May 2019. Maths Paper 3 (Reasoning) is scheduled for Thursday 16th May 2019.
- Both have standard timings of 40 minutes and are worth 35 marks each.
- Paper 2 requires children to demonstrate their mathematical knowledge and skills, as well as their ability to solve problems and their mathematical reasoning.


- Questions focus on the following mathematical topic areas:
 - Number and place value—including Roman Numerals;
 - Addition, subtraction, multiplication and division (calculations);
 - Geometry properties of shapes;
 - Geometry position and direction;
 - Statistics;
 - Measurement including length, perimeter, mass (weight), volume, time and money;
 - Algebra;
 - Ratio and proportion;
 - Fractions, decimals and percentages.



Maths Paper 3 Reasoning (35 marks and 40 minutes)

What is the difference between the raw score and the scaled score?

- The raw score is the score out of the total possible marks on the paper.
- This is converted to a scaled score using a conversion table.
- In order to pass the assessment in a subject, the scaled score must be 100 or above.

When do we find out the results?

When school reports go home at the end of the year, there will be an additional sheet of paper inside which shows your child's scaled score for each subject. Parents and carers can request the raw score from school.

Scaled scores for 2016, 2017 and 2018

- Reading -21 out of 50 = scaled score of 100.
- ▶ SPaG 43 out of 70 = scaled score of 100
- Maths- 60 out of 110 = scaled score of 100.
- Reading 26 out of 50 = scaled score of 100.
- ▶ SPaG 36 out of 70 = scaled score of 100
- Maths- 57 out of 110 = scaled score of 100.
- Reading -28 out of 50 = scaled score of 100.
- ▶ SPaG 38 out of 70 = scaled score of 100
- Maths- 61 out of 110 = scaled score of 100.

Interim frameworks for SPaG, reading, mathematics and science

- For KS2 reading, mathematics and science, the frameworks contain one standard: working at the expected standard.
- A pupil who has completed the programme of study will be judged as either 'working at the expected standard' or 'has not met the expected standard'.

Greater depth

- A scaled score of 110 or more is CONSIDERED to be at greater depth.
- 2018 Scaled Scores
- Reading 40 out of 50 = scaled score of 110.
- ▶ SPaG 56 out of 70 = scaled score of 110
- Maths- 96 out of 110 = scaled score of 110.

Writing

- For pupils who have completed the KS2 programme of study, Y6 teachers will use the TA frameworks when making their judgements. The KS2 English writing framework contains 3 standards:
- working towards the expected standard
- working at the expected standard
- working at greater depth within the expected standard

Writing

- write effectively for a range of purposes and audiences, selecting language that shows good awareness of the reader
- in narratives, describe settings, characters and atmosphere
- integrate dialogue in narratives to convey character and advance the action
- select vocabulary and grammatical structures that reflect what the writing requires, doing this mostly appropriately
- use a range of devices to build cohesion (e.g. conjunctions, adverbials of time and place, pronouns, synonyms) within and across paragraphs
- use verb tenses consistently and correctly throughout their writing
- use the range of punctuation taught at key stage 2 mostly correctly
- spell correctly most words from the year 5 / year 6 spelling list,* and use a dictionary to check the spelling of uncommon or more ambitious vocabulary
- maintain legibility in joined handwriting when writing at speed.

What about science?

- It is teacher assessed. Currently, science can be reported as working at the expected standard or not and is based on work completed in lessons.
- A selection of schools will be chosen to take part in the science sampling tests in June.


What are we doing at school?

- Practice papers-sometimes in pairs
- Practice papers as homework
- Homework linked to SPaG
- SPaG/spelling sessions
- Class Guided Reading sessions
- Five A Day arithmetic questions

What can you do to help?

- Let your child know there is nothing to worry about
- Be positive
- Support them with homework
- Encourage them to learn and practise their weekly spellings and Word Walls 3-6
- Work through practice Sats papers
- Collect new/unfamiliar vocabulary
- Use revision guides-e.g. CGP
- Encourage use of a dictionary to check spelling and a thesaurus to find synonyms and expand vocabulary.

What can you do to help?



What happens if my child is ill during SATs week?

- It is really important that, where possible, the child attends school to sit the tests with their peers. If a child is too ill to sit some or all of the tests, school can arrange for them to do them at a later date.
- If a child is injured but their ability to write isn't affected, they should still do the tests. If their ability to write is affected, school can provide a member of staff to scribe for them.
