









Matthew Henson in the Arctic

Matthew Henson in the Arctic

In 1909, Matthew Henson reached what he thought was the North Pole. It was a very long and difficult exploration.

Matthew Henson travelled with the Inuit of Greenland and the exploration was led by Robert Peary. Robert had wanted to be the first to get to the North Pole to be famous and make money.

The team had sledges pulled by dogs. They sometimes rode on the sledges but they also walked on skis which were made of wood.

Every night, they made an igloo from snow to sleep in. They had blankets under them and on top of them too. They wore a deerskin shirt and their trousers, boots and coats (or parkas) were also made from fur. Sometimes they wore snow goggles which were made from wood with slits cut for them to see through.

They used a compass and a sextant to find their way and to check where they were. After the exploration, it was Robert's measurements that were questioned when some people said that the team did not make it to the North Pole.

They ate pemmican (a mixture of dried meat, dried berries and fat). This was high in energy but did not provide them with as much energy as modern food for explorers.

Felicity Aston in the Antarctic

In 2012, Felicity Aston was the first person to ski alone across Antarctica using just her own power. It was a long and difficult exploration.

Felicity travelled on skis. The skis and ski poles were made of layers of different materials and were lighter than in the past. She pulled a sledge with her equipment loaded on it.

Every night, Felicity slept in a tent that was specially designed for providing shelter from cold temperatures. She slept in a warm sleeping bag.

She wore warm clothes mostly made from human-made materials. Many modern coats for polar explorers are made from a combination of human-made fabrics and down (feathers). Felicity made sure that her face was covered when she was out of the tent. She wore snow goggles to protect her eyes from the sun.

Felicity used a compass to help her find the way and used GPS to check her location and to mark it on a map. GPS was also used for others to track her. She also carried satellite phones in case she needed to contact anyone.

She ate freeze-dried meals that were high in energy. These come in a variety of flavours and need hot water to be added to them.

Answers

What were the differences between Felicity Aston's exploration and the exploration by Matthew Henson?

- **Matthew Henson explored in a group but Felicity Aston went on her exploration alone.**
- **Matthew Henson's team had sledges pulled by dogs but Felicity Aston pulled her own sledge.**
- **Matthew Henson's skis were made of wood but Felicity Aston's were lighter skis made from layers of different materials.**
- **Matthew Henson slept on and under blankets in an igloo but Felicity Aston slept in a sleeping bag in a tent.**
- **Matthew Henson wore animal furs and skins to keep warm but Felicity Aston dressed in clothes made from warm, mostly human-made materials.**
- **Matthew Henson wore snow goggles made from wood with slits cut for him to see through but Felicity Aston wore modern snow goggles.**
- **Matthew Henson's team used a compass and a sextant to work out where they were and where they should go but Felicity Aston used a compass and GPS.**
- **Matthew Henson ate pemmican but Felicity Aston ate freeze-dried food.**
- **Matthew Henson may not have reached the North Pole but it is known that Felicity set out to achieve her aim.**
