Possibility

Modal verbs can be used when we want to show how likely something is to happen. E.g. *It might rain tomorrow.*

Ability

Modal verbs can be used when we want to show a skill or someone's ability to do something. For example:

E.g.Jack can sing.

Obligation and advice

Modal verbs can be used to state when something is necessary/compulsory, to give an instruction or to give advice.

E.g. You must tidy your room.

Permission

Modal verbs are used to give or ask for permission for an activity.

E.g. You may have another biscuit.
