Conjunctions

Part A

Conjunctions are words such as: and but or

Co-ordinating conjunctions can be used to link two sentences together. Each sentence would make sense if it was on its own. These are called co-ordinating conjunctions.

e.g. <u>Duncan's favourite colour is blue(but)he also likes red.</u>



...are used to link ideas in a sentence, by giving more detail. This is called subordination.

e.g. <u>Duncan finds some letters</u> when <u>he opens his school bag</u>.
